Double happiness

inding this home, a circa-1910 cottage on acreage on the outskirts of Sydney, was a stroke of luck for Peter and Carolyn Meadows. Known as Boorabee, it was perfectly located and had significant heritage features. "We were attracted by the home's potential," says Carolyn. "We had been looking for a house that was all on one level with

some land around it, but still close to town. Boorabee is less than 80km from the Sydney CBD and close to local shops and transport, yet still feels rural."

Making Boorabee home wasn't going to be easy. Peter and Carolyn planned to share the property with their adult sons Marcus and Daniel, daughter-in-law Elyse and 20-month-old granddaughter Layla, but at a minuscule 11m², the cottage would be a pretty tight squeeze. All the key elements had to be replaced – roof, verandah, timberwork, doors and windows, wiring and plumbing – and heritage listing required careful navigation of building restrictions. Space to entertain was also high on the wish list.

After consulting a local architect and town planner, Carolyn and Peter came up with a plan for a two-bedroom extension linked to the restored cottage via a breezeway. "The new structure couldn't be higher or more imposing than the original," says Carolyn. "The solution was to tuck the extension >

A central entertaining courtyard and pool area neatly connects old and new.

The home's main entrance, now relocated to the extension, opens to a spacious foyer and, across the hall, a generous open-plan kitchen/ family room. Immediately to the left of the entrance is the home cinema; down the hall is the original cottage, now accommodation for Daniel, Elyse and little Layla. Following the corridor to the right leads to the study, Marcus' bedroom, dining room and Carolyn and Peter's sumptuous main bedroom suite.

Construction complete, the couple engaged interior designer Terri Shannon, director of Bloom Interior Design & Decoration to create a decorating scheme that would unite the two halves of this whole. "We settled on a classic-contemporary aesthetic, with a luxurious, distinctly Australian feel," says Terri. In the cottage, period or replica fittings were used wherever possible to maintain the character; in the extension, they opted for modern takes on those elements. A colour palette of greys and creams, used indoors and out, is the unifying thread.

As well as more than tripling the living space, Peter and Carolyn took full advantage of the opportunity to bring Boorabee into the 21st century, installing a state-of-the-art sound system, solar panels and a bore-water system for the gardens. "It's so comfortable to live in and easy to look after," says Carolyn.

Boorabee is very much a working property, with the couple keeping sheep, polo horses and chickens on their 10.9ha holding. But thanks to all the luxe touches, the home feels more like a country retreat, says Carolyn. "We never take the beauty around us for granted. We just love being home."


